



A New Contest: The Cassatt Alley Awards

In May of 2022, the GT collaborated with the West Chester BID in beautifying our alleys by planting them with native flowers. The first project was at the Chestnut Street garage which set the standard for alley beautification. The Green Team has done small projects here and there and a major one at CC Art Association. Next year, 2023, borough residents will have a chance to show off their own talents in alley design and landscaping, encouraging beautification borough-wide.

Welcome to the Cassatt Alley Awards contest. There are two categories of awards: residential property and alley cat of the year. You must be nominated to be judged, and people may nominate their own properties or those of neighbors. The awards will be judged by a 5-judge panel of horticulturalists and landscape architects with awards presented on Saturday, August 26, at a banquet.

Extra credit will be awarded for the use of native plants. Each alley will be judged on its overall design, its friendliness and welcoming nature as well as its use of plant materials and overall appeal. The alley cat award will go to the person or persons who have worked most successfully in bringing attention to the importance and potential of West Chester's alleys.

The Cassatt Alley contest opens on June 1, and judging will continue during the months of June and July. Winners will be notified on August 1 with prizes awarded on August 26. Application forms will be available online and through the WCGT website beginning May 20. Multiple prizes may be awarded in each category.



Before and after shots of your alley would be helpful to the judges who will also do site visits. Thomas Dougherty, architect and alley expert, will be one of the judges.

Meanwhile, the borough has been informed of speeding in the alleys and asked to enforce the 15 mph speed limit. Patrick McCoy, Borough Council representative in Ward 1, has been notified of these alley issues and is helping out. With the Green Team's increased focus on water quality issues as highlighted by our November Water Panel, we are working at assessing and decreasing the use of salt in alleys this winter so our beautiful plants will not be poisoned.

May the best gardeners win!

Philip Jamison Art & Nature Award

Remarks by Beth Clark, Winner of this year's award

To honor the Green Team's friendship with Chester County artist Philip Jamison and to celebrate his life and art, illustrating the beauty of the Chester County countryside, the West Chester Green Team established an Art and Nature Award in his memory this year. The award was given for the first time on November 15 at a ceremony at West Chester University. The award was presented by GT leader David Wickard and Philip Jamison, Jr. to West Chester artist Beth Clark. Her remarks follow:

I have been fortunate to have lived most of my life in Chester County, my childhood home a stone's throw from the Stroud Preserve. I grew up knowing three artists, who shall we say, were from this side of the Brandywine.

I clearly remember when I was six, Tom Bostelle coming around to our kitchen door, never the front door, to begin my portrait – the last of the six Clarks he painted. There were wonderful visits to his various studios at various stages of my life, lastly at the Aeolian Palace. The smell of the oil paint was always infectious and his insights on EVERYTHING were thought provoking. I kept in touch with him until his passing in 2005. I recall a favorite quote of his "Chester County grew up in me."

When I was 12, through my brother Michael, I met Dennis Haggerty. We became friends and I, a yearly Brian's Run participant, always made sure his Chili party was a part of that day. He was a strong supporter of my work and I was invited to visit him in Taos NM, where we painted the landscape together, giving me insight into his approach and process.

I was 19 when I studied landscape painting with Bill Freeland through a Moore College of Art summer school class. It was my first serious painting class and a truly transformative experience. Six hours a day. Three days a week. Six weeks. Outside. He would share his Bostelle painting escapades with me and became a mentor and dear friend and was always happy to give me a welcome, if impromptu, critique.

But I never met Phil Jamison until, about 10 years ago, I had 2 small paintings in the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts Alumni show. The gallery director called and said "A Mr. Philip Jameson has bought one of your pieces. I see you both live in West Chester. Do you think you could drop off his piece?" Knowing Phil's reputation as a collector I thought this was pretty cool to say the least. I contacted Phil and we agreed on a meeting time at his place on Price St. He answered the door wearing one of his iconic plaid short sleeved shirts. Entering the house, he showed me where my piece would be hung and said, "You are really good – where have you been?" Over the past decade we stayed in touch: his visits to me on the Chester County Studio Tour, me to his exhibitions, and my visits several times to see his impressive art collection at his home.

I thank the Green Team for this truly humbling and unexpected award, and I will always think of Phil when outside painting the landscape. A line from my artist statement succinctly sums up my philosophy: "the same location is always a new place" I think Philip Jamison would agree.

Crebilly Farm Preserved!

Westtown voters just preserved a piece of our past and gave a present to future generations. Residents had their chance to speak up, and speak up they did.

It's tough not to get choked up after six years of working to save Crebilly Farm. In the early days of the fight, things looked bleak. Many a night, we looked across the auditorium at Toll Brothers' army of consultants and attorneys and felt overwhelmed. "Look at all those tailored suits. Look at all those \$500 shoes. Look at all those Rolexes!"

We were every bit the underdog, but those of us involved on the ground knew that we had a weapon Toll Brothers didn't have: massive public support for saving Crebilly and an army of our own willing to work to save this iconic farm. That army showed up in force over the past several months and fought to make yesterday's overwhelming result possible. A beautiful place got saved. Those who made sacrifices on September 11, 1777, got honored. Our posterity got a bequest. We got an amazing new park.

We can't just thank the army of supporters, though. "YES" prevailed in every precinct and garnered nearly 70% of the vote overall because people intuitively understand the value of preserving open space. It's not all dollars and cents to most people. It's the intangibles like our legacy, our desire to give back, our selfless instincts. Residents asked and answered "what are we leaving behind?" "What kinds of citizens do we want our kids to be?" "What can we do for our country?"

With this huge step in the process under our belt, the grant money will hopefully follow and the process of turning Crebilly into a public preserve will begin. So it's with an all-consuming gratitude that we say thanks to all the people over the past six years who saw the possible and were willing to work to make it happen.



Pollinator Conservation License Plate & Program

From Sen. Carolyn Comitta's office:

Want to show your support for protecting pollinators? You'll soon be able to – on your license plate!

Act 112 of 2022, a new law based on legislation that state Sen. Carolyn Comitta introduced with state Rep. Kristine Howard, establishes the Pollinator Conservation Registration Plate and the Pollinator Habitat Program Fund. Sales of the specialty license plates will support a new program to support the migration of pollinators by creating native grass and perennial wildflower-filled habitats along our state highways.

Pollinators are vital to environmental health, public health, and our very way of life. By cultivating new pollinator habitats, we are not only supporting these animals, but also our food supply, our agriculture industry, and our economy as a whole. <u>Watch.</u>

Our friends at Bondsville are taking on a big meadow project. Here's what's happening:

Daffodil bulbs. David Culp threw 15,000+ bulbs here and there in the garden. The gardeners and friends have been working overtime to get them in the ground. There's a design but we won't see it until spring when the daffs begin blooming. One species, 'Queen of the North', will ribbon through the area while 'W.P. Milner' will bloom a week or two later and buffer the design.

These are Heirloom Daffodils: Narcissus 'Queen of the North' dates back to pre-1908. The Narcissus 'W P Milner' is as old as the Mill dating back to 1869. It was distinctive enough to win an award of Merit.



News from WCU

Climate Anxiety Program:

On November 30, the West Chester University Sustainability Peer Educators hosted a Climate-Anxiety themed event for students and staff alike. The goal of the event was, as self-described by the flyers, "to provide students and staff a way to relax and confront their personal climate anxieties". Refreshments were served, and succulents, flowerpots for painting, and other crafts were all provided. From 5-7pm, any personnel in Sykes could stop by and enjoy the relaxing atmosphere, and truly understand what it means to be climate-anxious.



Climate anxiety is, in general, a large issue that lacks prominence in the media but affects nearly everyone. A survey of 10,000 citizens across the globe, conducted by *Nature.com* in 2021, found that a stunning 95% of young people feel at least a little worried about the current climate of Earth. Nearly 50% were either moderately or extremely worried and provided testimony to the surveyors about how much anxiety the state of the Earth's climate gave them. Having an event like this one at West Chester University helped reduce this anxiety and allowed students to voice their worries in a supportive, productive, environment. One student even stated that, "It was an immense relief to have other students who felt the same way as I do."

VegOut Thanksgiving:



In mid-November, West Chester University's own vegan organization, VegOut, hosted a fully vegan thanksgiving in Sykes Student Union. The club--which is the largest vegan organization in the state of PA--was excited to have their Vegan Thanksgiving event back after COVID-19. From 2020-2021, almost all food-related events were barred from West Chester University, and it was a welcome relief to have the community rejoin for Thanksgiving again. Foods included vegan mac and cheese, mashed potatoes, sweet potato pie, and much more.

The event was crowded thanks to a very large turnout. Organizers believed the prominence was helped by the appearance of the therapy dogs outside, which were coincidentally scheduled at the same time as the event. Students spilled out of the Sykes ballrooms, brought food, and got to connect with fellow vegans in the West Chester University community. Even after the event was officially over, many stayed to talk and discuss what it means to be vegan on a budget--in a place where accessing a kitchen can be difficult.

Rail Service for West Chester?

Join us on December 20th to voice your support for green, affordable passenger rail service.

In 2014, to address the growing need to reintroduce passenger rail for West Chester residents, Borough Council created an ad hoc committee to re-establish rail service to the Borough.

Now, thanks to the innovative work of RDC and Pop-Up Metro, we may have the capacity to utilize our old rail lines to serve their original purpose: passenger rail to Philadelphia. Pop-Up Metro is built from the ground up to utilize one of the United States's least utilized infrastructure systems - old rail lines. To do so, the company upcycles older passenger train cars, modulating them with full safety standards and creating a green-focus through battery-powered engines.

The result ends in a safe, accessible, green, and cost-effective way to reintroduce rail lines which can take us from West Chester to Philadelphia in under an hour.

There is an astounding amount of interest in passenger rail service from you. With your voice, support and engagement we can have green and affordable passenger rail service. **Please come** to the next Borough Council meeting **at Borough Hall at 6:30pm on Tuesday December 20th and make your remarks during public comment.**
