
More Coming Attractions

We will be hosting a garden and house tour at select locations around the Borough. Come check out how other people care for their gardens, raise chickens, provide for pollinators and other native species, and adapt to changing landscapes. This free event will be on Saturday, June 22. Gardens will be open from 10am to 4pm and houses open from 11am to 3pm. This year's garden tour goes a bit beyond and features two GT members who are working toward a zero-waste lifestyle. Megan Schraedly and Christiane Torres will invite you in to see the chickens and the composting, the bread baking, and the reused clothing. Margaret and Jim Hudgings will open their home to show a Hazley renovation that they hope will allow them to stay home as they age. It is best for

All month in June: PA Firefly Festival



Lights Out For Lightning Bugs: Starting June 1 through the month of June, you can do your part to help protect and conserve the fireflies in your backyard. The decline of fireflies worldwide is due to many reasons all of which are results of human causes. The most obvious cause is light pollution. The lights interfere with the mating behaviors of fireflies. Fireflies lighting displays are how they find mates, and if artificial light is shining, they can't compete or see their mates.

We can help by simply turning off outdoor lighting during the mating season, which in our area is mostly the month of June. If you can't turn off your lights completely, consider shading them so they are focused to a smaller area on the ground, or use a timer or motion detectors to reduce the amount of time the lights are on at night.

Reducing or eliminating lighting also helps other nocturnal insects and others species of birds, reptiles and mammals. Humans also benefit from darkness by

improving natural circadian rhythms and other health benefits. If we reduce our lighting, we will see a reduction in energy costs too.

So, we hope you will join us in the Lights Out For Lightning Bugs this June. Go outside and watch for fireflies and enjoy the dark skies in your favorite park or backyard. Other ways you can help fireflies:

- Identify wetter, shady areas and leave them be. This includes minimal foot traffic and mowing, no pesticides, and let leaf litter and decaying wood accumulate.
- Provide a clean water source
- Plant a variety of native plants.

Our Legendary Lenape Summer Program is back and registration is now open! This free, family-friendly 4-week program will meet on select Saturdays in July and August. We will continue to learn about the Lenape, the Indigenous people who lived here before European settlers arrived. Their place names and ways of growing and cooking live with us and often go unrecognized. Each week will we have different activities such as canoeing on Westtown Lake, creating clay pots and other Lenape crafts, learning the Lenape language, studying streams and butterflies at Bondsville Mill, and ending the summer with a banquet at Camp Liden.
