Hosts Donna and Dave Delany have made their farm into a showcase of native plants suitable for various habitats, stressing symbiotic relationships between plants, pollinators, birds and the rest of the local environment.

We will meet at the Preserve, discuss your choice of highlights for the tour (such as flowers, vegetables, sun, shade, borders, water runoff and planting native), and embark on a guided tour. Rest facilities are available, as well as native plants for purchase. For those who wish, nearby Butterscotch Pastry in Birchrunville serves lunch, and also nearby Bryn Coed Preserve beckons for an afternoon hike.

Volunteer of the Month: Stephen Marvin



Radical Gardening

Sa'ed Atshan's talk at the Green Team's April 26 annual dinner offered us, very appropriately, the term "radical hope." Hope is what keeps us going in hard times, a realm of calm where we can recharge our optimism and love of life.

What often keeps me going is what I think of as radical gardening. Long ago when I lived elsewhere in West Chester, I came up with a theory that whatever can be seen from the sidewalk belongs to the people that see it. Not that it is physically their property, but that they have the right to improve the esthetics and the horticultural statement.

So, some of us began weeding and planting in areas that needed better plants than the owners seemed capable of providing. That may have been a marginal idea, but no one ever objected, and it improved the streetscape. It is, in a way, what the Green Team is doing now, in its plantings to improve areas visible to the public, except that the Green Team has permission.

I do think that we all have a duty to beautify that part of our surroundings that can be seen by passers-by. And they are appreciative. When I'm out tending to our banks sloping down toward the street and our plantings that go right up the street because we don't have a sidewalk, people walking by often offer their appreciation, and that makes the labor even more worthwhile than the meditative peace that the gardener derives from the gardening. So, to me, radical gardening is a form of hope: a spiritual uplift as well as a community value.

Planting at the Justice Center

Ollie Finneran, age 12 and a sixth grader at Pierce Middle School, joined the West Chester Green

Team volunteers on Saturday morning May 3 as they planted a pollinator-friendly garden of native plants at the Chester County Justice Center.

Ollie commented, "I think that the garden makes the building look better, and it helps the insects who make oxygen for us to breathe and gives homes to animals such as butterflies and bees." This summer, Ollie plans to intern with the Green Team, helping with outdoor activities such as canoeing at Westtown Lake. His work with the Green Team counts toward his Boy Scout volunteer hours.

Ollie and his mom Courtney with about twenty other volunteer planters from the local community gave their time to beautify the Justice Center. Joining the planting efforts were Molly Hanford, the head of the Green Team's Porchfest Committee and Brian Egan who is in charge of finances for the event. Sue Patterson from the West Chester Cooperative which is opening a

grocery store across from the Justice Center lent a hand as did long-time local gardener Jim Hines who donates produce to the Food Cupboard and artist and gardener Mandy Stadtmiller. Susan Silverstein, who also volunteers at the Chester County Intermediate Unit Horticultural program, attended with one of her students. "We're planting paradise at the Justice Center," she quipped.

West Chester Green Team vice president, Chris Pugliese, designed the garden and supervised its installation, and Chester County Sustainability Director Rachael Griffith guided it through the approval process at the county. Griffith commented, "We're so thankful for the Green Team expertise leading this important project. The garden is going to be beautiful, and I hope it will spark interest in new gardens at other county facilities."



Take off lid, dry out paint, discard can without lid; or pour paint into plastic bag with absorbent material (clay based kitty litter, saw dust, rags) place bag and can without lid, in trash. Paint hardener can also be purchased at hardware stores.

DROP OFF GUIDELINES

- NO TVs, electronics, or appliances will be accepted.
- · Event workers will unload your materials so please remain in your vehicle.
- BUSINESSES AND CONTRACTORS WILL BE TURNED AWAY, no commercial/industrial waste accepted.
- · Bring all substances in original containers with labels. Items must be identifiable. Do not mix materials.
- Gas containers returned upon request. Please attached a note to your container if you want it back.
- Tighten lids on all containers. If containers are leaking, pack in larger container with newspaper to soak up leaks.
- · Maximum amount accepted per vehicle is 25 gallons total volume or 220 pounds total weight.
- No 25- or 50-gallon drums. 5-gallon buckets are the largest container accepted.
- There are no permanent drop off locations in the region for household hazardous waste, only the listed collections.

18 PA Counties Get 'F' Grade For Pollution, New Analysis Says

by Kara Seymour in <u>West Chester Patch</u> (5/2/25) gives us the bad news from the American Lung Association's *State of the Air 2025 Report*.

According to that 155-page analysis of the latest available figures:

HIGH OZONE DAYS 2021–2023: Chester County earned a C HIGH PARTICLE POLLUTION DAYS 2021–2023: Chester County earned an F

Those ratings are based on the number of days a year when the indicated pollution type fell in the range from Unhealthy for Sensitive Groups up to Very Unhealthy or Hazardous.

This is a warning for people living in Chester County, because "Particle pollution – also known as particulate matter or soot – is a deadly and growing threat to public health in communities around the country. The more researchers learn about the health effects of particle pollution, the more dangerous it is recognized to be."

Studies have shown that particle pollution contributes to a host of problems including heart disease, lung cancer, and premature death. And those in turn drive up illness, disability, health insurance costs, and household medical expenses.

And as the Patch article says: "The report noted that the burden of living with unhealthy air is not shared equally and that communities of color are disproportionately exposed to air pollution."

Public officials at all levels can improve air quality... if they can find a way to take the necessary measures.
