Coming in March:

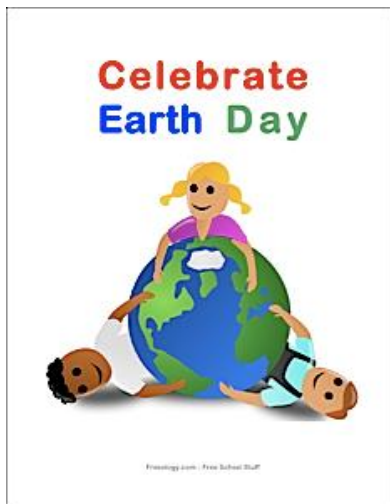
University of Pennsylvania Professor Erick Guerra, author of the book entitled *Overbuilt: The High Costs and Low Rewards of US Highway Construction* (<https://islandpress.org/books/overbuilt#desc>) will present an evening lecture at WCU. 6:30pm, BPMC Bldg., Rm 116.

April 23:

Will Caverly, author of *Tinicum & Eastwick: Environmental Justice and Racial Injustice in Southwest Philadelphia* (<https://www.brooklinebooks.com/9781955041140/tinicum-and-eastwick/>) will present an evening lecture at WCU, time and location to be announced. The book is a history of urban planning and environment in the city's formerly rural southwest. The Eastwick neighborhood was subject to a brutal urban renewal/slum clearance project. This project also threatened what

would later become the Heinz Refuge, the last portion of (relatively) unspoiled tidal marshlands in SW Philly. The book follows two grassroots movements that formed in response - one to save the homes of humans, the other to save the homes of birds.

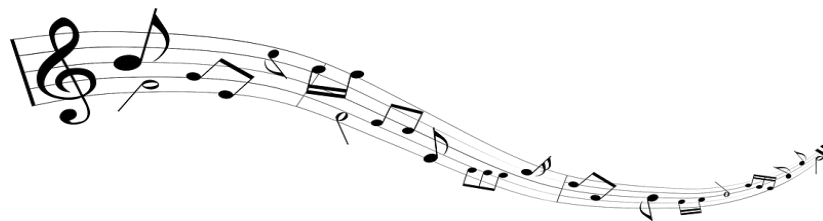
Can you believe we're already preparing for Porchfest?

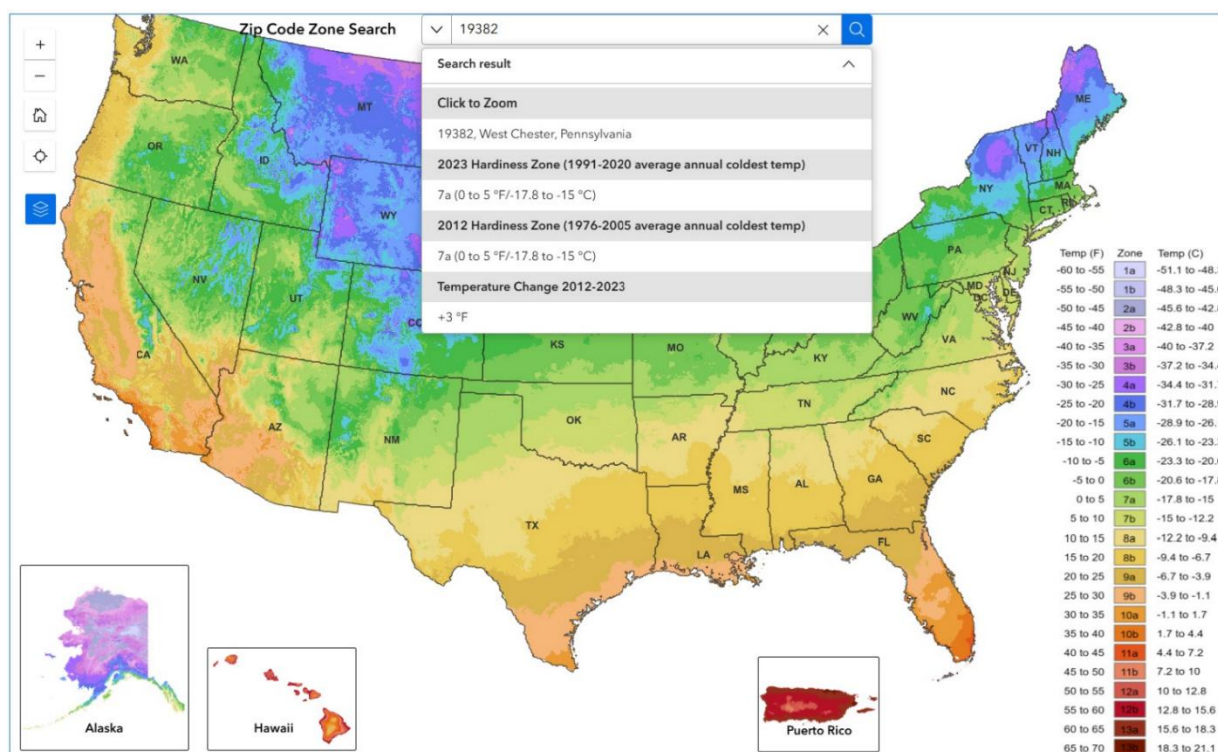

Educating Kids on Plastic Pollution

A community where everyone leads an environmentally conscious lifestyle - this is what I am trying to do by creating entertaining and informative videos for young kids. Disney and other animation studios are able to spread their entertainment and messages to millions of people. Movies like The Lion King, Inside Out, and WALL-E have reached an audience of around 80-180 million people. Animation has the power to inspire people to take action or just bring awareness to an issue. Hi, my name is Yashvi Kiran, I am a 14-year-old plastics campaigner. I create animation videos, comics, and posters to educate younger kids on the impacts of plastic pollution.

I started working on plastic pollution when I was 9 years old, and tried different methods of spreading awareness, eventually landing on animation videos. With one video, I was able to reach twenty-six thousand viewers and inspire them to make environmentally conscious decisions.



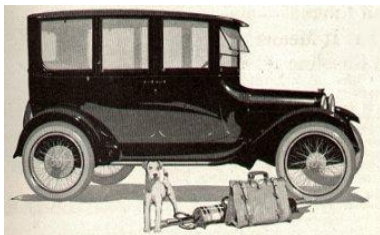
Many adults and even most of my classmates are ignorant of these issues. This is why I believe it is important to educate the younger generations in order to create a greener future and prevent these environmental problems from getting out of hand. I believe visual media can improve younger generations' awareness of environmental issues by teaching important concepts at an early age, when values and habits are still forming. Visual media can turn deep environmental topics into fun and engaging stories. When environmental problems are presented in a creative and entertaining way, children are more likely to pay attention and understand how they can play their part in reducing environmental issues. Animated stories can also motivate kids and push them towards greener habits. Visual media not only teaches children about the consequences of environmental issues but also can inspire them to care about protecting the planet. As a result, they are more likely to grow up understanding the consequences of pollution and ecological problems and make sensible decisions.



Posters and animations can reach more people around the world than in-person campaigning. Animated videos can be shared online through social media, streaming platforms, and educational websites, allowing millions of people from different countries and cultures to access the same content. Because graphic media relies on visuals and storytelling rather than text, it can communicate ideas across language barriers, making environmental issues understandable to viewers around the world and inspiring action in communities globally.

Many adults and teens in the US are unaware of the seriousness of environmental problems simply because they were never taught about them at a young age. After doing campaigns in England and India, I have noticed a lack of environmental awareness in elementary schools in the US compared to these countries. For example, in my previous school in the UK, a group would frequently come over to the school and perform fun skits on environmental issues. However, when doing a plastics event at my school, many of my classmates believed plastic pollution only affected the environment and not themselves. Without early exposure, it can be difficult to understand how environmental issues affect us. This is why it is important to teach children now, so future generations grow up aware of how they can contribute to reducing these issues.
